## **PROJECT STATEMENT**

Community of Hope's mission to improve health outcomes and support the needs of families in DC's underserved communities led them to develop a new, expanded home for their Family Health and Birth Center, which includes the only freestanding birth center in the District. Community of Hope engaged the design team to repurpose a 1960's office building and, through sustainable design practices, create a community health center to embrace, support, and celebrate the local community.

### **DESIGN NARRATIVE**

How does this project address Design for Integration, Wellbeing, and Discovery?

With an emphasis on expecting mothers and their babies, this Center provides a comprehensive set of medical and social services designed to help families thrive, including a primary care clinic, behavioral health, WIC, pharmacy and lab access, and two birth suites. The multipurpose space hosts group prenatal and well-child visits in a model that brings women due at the same time together, creating a community structure that supports women in the transition to motherhood and the stresses that come with it.

The design was driven by discovery workshops with local families of color who experienced both hospital and birth center deliveries. This process set the experiential and aesthetic direction, creating soft, curvaceous, and welcoming spaces. The Center displays work by local artists of color throughout the Center and a rotating gallery of expecting mothers' belly casts with the goal of embracing and celebrating the beauty of the pregnant body.

## **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

How does this project address Design for Equitable Communities and Economy

Generating awareness is crucial for Community of Hope. For people without sufficient healthcare coverage, a freestanding birth center serves as an alternative to hospitals and their exorbitant costs. It also provides women with more control over their birth experiences. As the organization seeks to rectify the chronically poor birth outcomes of Black women in the immediate community and throughout the United States, drawing attention to safe alternatives is a top priority.

Our nation's capital has been identified as the "most dangerous place to give birth in the U.S. for Black women," with among the worst maternal and infant mortality rates.

Additionally, following the closure of three hospitals, portions of DC are considered a Maternity Desert. This birth center offers a safe and affordable alternative to hospital births, and it directly addresses birth inequities by placing control in the hands of female midwives who hold positions of trust in the community.

### SUSTAINABILITY AND RESILIENCE

How does this project address Design for Ecosystems, Water, Energy, Resources, and Change?

The project's main approach to sustainability was the decision to repurpose and expand on an aging 1960's office building instead of building new. The project includes green rooves to address water runoff and material selections were made with occupant health in mind. The project was designed to meet LEED silver.

# Unapologetically Feminine. Designed for and with women in the community








Input from local mothers of color who experienced both hospital and birth center deliveries drove the design.


They sought to create a welcoming atmosphere, one that is comfortable and approachable, with sense of familiarity.



Community Engagement events informed a design language celebrating femininity and family through the concept dubbed captivating curves.








**Level 01** - Family Health Clinic, Lab, Provider Workspace




Level 02 - Birthing Center, Pharmacy, Behavioral Health



**Level 03** - Case Management + Staff Workspace






A green roof provides a natural touch visible from the interior but also illustrates the project's dedication to sustainable design.
